### Question 1 — [Financial Accounting / Trial Balance Reconciliation]

A bookkeeper at Pinnacle Consulting Ltd prepared a trial balance which failed to agree, with the credit side exceeding the debit side by £360. A suspense account was opened. Which of the following errors, when corrected, could explain this difference?
